The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage has publicly launched!

The NEP (<u>https://www.eucharisticpilgrimage.org/</u>) will consist of four cross-country Eucharistic processions, collectively traversing the entire continental United States over a two-month period, beginning during the feast of Pentecost, May 17-19, 2024.

The pilgrimage is being organized by the National Eucharistic Revival campaign in conjunction with Modern Catholic Pilgrim, a Catholic nonprofit dedicated to deepening the faith across



the country through pilgrimages. Along the way, the pilgrims will make stops in major US cities, churches, Catholic colleges, and holy sites. Parishes along the routes will host Mass, adoration, devotions, praise and workshop, lectures on the Eucharist, and more.

The Seton Route, which will begin in New Haven, Connecticut, will be passing through the Diocese of Metuchen on May 27-29, 2024. The four pilgrimage processions will ultimately converge in Indianapolis on July 16, 2024, to participate in the National Eucharistic Congress. Adam Carlisle, Secretary of Evangelization and Communication, will be helping to organize our diocese's involvement. 
EUCHARISTIC GUARDIANS




Prayer to St. Anthony Mary Claret

BOOKS ON THE HOLY EUCHARIST *Pick of the Week* The Everlasting Man by G.K. Chesterton



Considered by many to be Chesterton's greatest masterpiece of all his writings, this is his whole view of world history as informed by the Incarnation. Beginning with the origin of man and the various religious attitudes throughout history, Chesterton shows how the fulfillment of all of man's desires takes place in the person of Christ and in Christ's Church.

Chesterton propounds the thesis that "those who say that Christ stands side by

side with similar myths, and his religion side by side with similar religions, are only repeating a very stale formula contradicted by a very striking fact." And with all the brilliance and devastating irony, so characteristic of his best writing, Chesterton gleefully and tempestuously tears to shreds that "very stale formula" and triumphantly proclaims in vivid language the glory and unanswerable logic of that very striking fact. EUCHARISTIC SAINTS SAINT HESYCHIUS OF JERUSALEM EASTERN ORTHODOX MONK WHO WAS A BIBLICAL INTERPRETER



St. Hesychius was a priest who wrote about the Bible in the liturgy. He viewed Scripture as "perfect wisdom, the point of departure and the point of arrival to which the whole of our existence should be conformed." Hesychius preached on Easter at the place of the crucifixion, exalting the cross and Christ's victory. Like St. Cyril of Jerusalem, he taught a realistic doctrine of the Eucharist, which he regarded as a sacrifice identical with that of the cross. Hesychius taught that Christ was present to transform us through our inner absorption of his whole being. "Keep yourselves free from sin so that every day you may share in the mystic meal; by doing so our bodies become the body of Christ."

Serving as a priest in the church in Jerusalem around the year 412, Hesychius gained a reputation as a theologian and catechist, so that by 429 he was recognized by chroniclers as the pre-eminent biblical interpreter and teacher of the church in Jerusalem and Palestine. Most of Hesychius' writings have been lost, although scholarship in the second half of the 20th century continues to identify more of his works hidden among Greek manuscripts and Latin translations. His biblical commentaries include

interpretations of the Old Testament books of Leviticus, Job, Isaiah, and Ezekiel. A celebrated moralistic annotation on the Psalms that had long been attributed to the 4th-century spokesman for orthodoxy, Athanasius of Alexandria, is now acknowledged as Hesychius's work.

Hesychius' preoccupation with symbolism led him to deny that a literal meaning could be found for every sentence in the Scriptures. In order to avoid heretical interpretations of Scripture, he rejected such philosophical terms as person, essence, or substance to express doctrine on the nature of Christ. On this point he allowed only the term *logos sarkotheis* ("the word made flesh"), a biblical concept. Credited with the earliest known liturgical addresses on the Virgin Mary, Hesychius also wrote a church history after 428 that controverted Nestorianism and other heretical beliefs. This text was incorporated into the proceedings of the second Council of Constantinople in 553. His feast day is March 28th.

EUCHARISTIC MIRACLES MORROVALLE, ITALY IN 1560



In Morrovalle, at about two o'clock in the morning of April 17, 1560, during the octave of Easter, Brother Angelo Blasi awoke with a start at the sound of violent crackling. Looking out the window of his cell, he saw the church was completely engulfed in flames, and he immediately ran to notify the other brothers. The fire was extinguished after seven hours, and in the following days began the work of clearing the massive pile of church ruins. On April 27, Father Battista da Ascoli was removing a piece of marble from what used to be the main altar and discovered the pyx (a container for the reserved host) in a wall cavity. Its corporal was scorched but the consecrated Host was still intact and in good condition. Father Battista shouted at the sight of the miracle, and many people immediately ran to the marvelous sight. For three entire days, the Blessed Sacrament was exposed for public adoration. When Franciscan provincial Father Evangelista da Morro d'Alba finally arrived, the miraculous Host was placed in an ivory case. The then-bishop of Bertinoro,

Ludovico di Forli, was immediately sent by Pope Pius IV to Morrovalle to investigate the authenticity of the event. As soon as he received the bishop's account, Pope Pius IV judged the occurrence to be without natural cause, and he authorized public devotion with the Bull "Holy Roman Church" (1560). The Bull proclaims the anniversaries of the fire and the discovery of the sacred Host (April 17 and 27) as feasts with plenary indulgences (so that they were known locally as the feasts "of the two pardons"). Because of the many faithful who came to the celebrations, the church was later expanded. Today, the feasts are celebrated with exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and of the pyx on the main altar. The pardons, namely the plenary indulgences, are available at the church of Saint Bartholomew. The miraculous Host was conserved intact until 1600 but due to the vicissitudes of history every trace of it was later lost. All that remains today is the glass ciborium and the pyx lid which survived the flames. The Eucharistic miracle's Fourth Centenary was celebrated in 1960, and the City Council unanimously decided to place at Morrovalle's main gate the inscription, "Civitas Eucaristica" (Eucharistic City).
