The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage has publicly launched!

The NEP (https://www.eucharisticpilgrimage.org/) will consist of four cross-country Eucharistic processions, collectively traversing the entire continental United States over a two-month period, beginning during the feast of Pentecost, May 17-19, 2024.

The pilgrimage is being organized by the National Eucharistic Revival campaign in conjunction with Modern Catholic Pilgrim, a Catholic nonprofit dedicated to deepening the faith across



the country through pilgrimages. Along the way, the pilgrims will make stops in major US cities, churches, Catholic colleges, and holy sites. Parishes along the routes will host Mass, adoration, devotions, praise and workshop, lectures on the Eucharist, and more.

The Seton Route, which will begin in New Haven, Connecticut, will be passing through the Diocese of Metuchen on May 27-29, 2024. The four pilgrimage processions will ultimately converge in Indianapolis on July 16, 2024, to participate in the National Eucharistic Congress. Adam Carlisle, Secretary of Evangelization and Communication, will be helping to organize our diocese's involvement. 



Pick of the Week

Theology for Beginners By Frank Sheed

Eucharistic Theology by Fr. John A. Hardon, S.J.

In the sixteenth century, theories concerning the Holy Eucharist ranged from complete symbolism to some kind of spiritual presence. To meet this challenge to the Catholic faith, the Council of Trent defined the Real Presence in a series of four canons:

1. The Church condemned "anyone who denies that the body and blood, together with the soul and divinity, of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore the *whole Christ* is truly, really, and substantially contained in the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, but says that Christ is present in the sacrament only as a sign, or figure, or by his power."

The "Whole Christ"

The expression "whole Christ" means that Christ is present in the "fullness of his divine and human natures"; it means that he is present under the sacramental appearances with the "totality of his divine attributes as well as human properties." How such is possible is part of theological speculation, but the fact is a matter of faith.

- 2. Some adversaries of the day were ready to admit a Real Presence, even a corporeal one, but claimed that Christ was present along with the elements of bread and wine. Not so, the Council held, as though "the substance of bread and wine remains in the holy sacrament of the Eucharist together with the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ." This would be to deny "that wonderful and extraordinary change of the whole substance of bread" into Christ's Body and whole substance of the wine into his Blood, while only the species of bread and wine remain, a change that the Catholic Church has fittingly called transubstantiation.
- 3. The Church answered the question whether Christ was present entirely under the form of bread alone or wine alone, or was he present only under the forms of bread and wine together. The Council affirmed that "in the venerable sacrament of the Eucharist the whole Christ is contained under each species and under each and every portion of either species when it is divided up." In the sixteenth century, the strong insistence that the chalice be given to everyone occasioned this definition, which was also the doctrinal foundation for receiving only under the form of bread.
- 4. Another theory held that the Real Presence is to be identified with the liturgical action. The Church declared that one cannot say that the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ are "present only in the use of the sacrament while it is being received, and not before or after, and that the true Body of the Lord does not remain in the consecrated hosts or particles. that are left over after Communion." This definition of the Council of Trent implies that Christ is present in the Eucharist really and objectively. His presence does not depend on the people's faith, piety or devotion.

Given the fact of Christ's presence as long as the species remain, it was only logical for the Church to worship the Blessed Sacrament as it would the presence of Jesus himself. As a result, he is to be adored "in the sacrament of the Eucharist with the worship of *latria*, including the external worship." Concretely this means that the Blessed Sacrament is to be "honored with extraordinary festive celebrations" and "solemnly carried from place to place" and "is to be publicly exposed for the people's adoration."

...As Presence, Christ confers grace on a sinful world just because he is in the tabernacle. As Sacrifice, Christ pours down his blessings of mercy on the whole human race every time that Mass is offered. And as Communion, he feeds our souls with his love, so that we might love him in return.

Our spiritual life will grow and our apostolates will flourish, on one condition: that we center our lives on the Eucharist. Why? Because the Eucharist is Jesus Christ living on earth, in our midst, today.

EUCHARISTIC SAINTS

ST. BROTHER ANDRÉ BESSETTE WHO CALLED HIMSELF ST. JOSEPH'S LITTLE DOG



Br. Andre Bessette called himself St. Joseph's little dog. He was born in Saint-Gregoire d'Iberville Quebec, Canada, August 9, 1845, and raised in a devout French Catholic family. By the time Br. Andre was twelve, both of his parents had died, and he was sent to live and work with relatives. Br. Andre's father was a carpenter like St. Joseph and his mother had a great devotion to St. Joseph which she passed on to little Andre, who was a sickly child. Br. Andre "had already often thought of Saint Joseph watching over the Child Jesus and he had made up his mind to imitate this saintly Workman, for he also was to watch over the Infant God Whom he carried at all times in his soul by divine grace and Whom he received with such deep piety in Holy Communion".

Br. Andre faced many challenges, especially as he tried to become a Holy Cross Brother. He grew in holiness and received the great gifts of compassion for the sick and healing, through the intercession of St. Joseph. He wanted to build a Shrine to St. Joseph on Mt. Royal across from the college where he worked as a doorkeeper, in Montreal, Quebec. He began with poor health, little education and no money and even his own Brothers said it was impossible. Still, Br. Andre placed total faith in God and the assistance of St. Joseph. A medal of St. Joseph was buried in the ground, where Br. Andre wished to build the Shrine, and countless prayers were offered. Miracles happened. A small Church was built, then a larger one. When the walls stood and there was no money for a roof, Br. Andre placed a statue of St. Joseph in the middle and said that the Saint would provide his own shelter; with Br. Andre's help and hard work he did. St. Joseph's home kept growing!

Br. Andre led weekly Stations of the Cross and a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration in the small chapel. His love of the Holy Eucharist was impregnated with a love for the sufferings of the Master; the Holy Hour which he inaugurated at the Oratory [of St. Joseph] every Friday evening was followed by the Way of the Cross. So great was Br. Andre's love for the Blessed Sacrament that he often spent his nights in prayer before Jesus. Br. Andre's bedroom, in which he cared for the sick and dying throughout the night, overlooked the chapel. Br. Andre cut out a window in his room so he could look at the tabernacle and pray to Him day and night.

Br. Andre spent hours in Eucharistic Adoration. Some of his quotes are below:

- "What would your wife say if you were a whole month without showing her any marks of affection? She would say that you do not love her. You would cause trouble in your home. Well, when you do not receive Communion God says to Himself that you do not love Him. And there is trouble in your soul."
- "If you ate only one meal a week would you survive? It is the same for your soul. Nourish it with the Blessed Sacrament."
- "Receive the Holy Communion often. Our Lord cannot refuse you anything when He is there in your heart. You will find strength and solace in this act".
- "O Holy angels, make me see God on the altar as you see Him in heaven."

It is often said that a dog is a man's best friend. Br. Andre, St. Joseph's little dog, certainly deserves the title of his best friend. Sometimes it was as if he was speaking with St. Joseph, said those who saw him in prayer. Br. Andre's advice to those wanting cures was simple: "Rub yourself with the blessed medal [of St. Joseph] and with St. Joseph's oil. Make a novena". Br. Andre encouraged novenas of Holy Communions, the Sacrament of Confession and the Stations of the Cross.

Br. Andre died on January 6, 1937, on the Feast of the Epiphany. A million people traveled to Montreal in the cold and snow to pay their respects to Br. Andre. Above all, Br. Andre desired for people to grow close to God and be healed. He was willing to offer up any sacrifice for the conversion of one soul. Br. Andre cared deeply about the sick, poor and suffering of the world. Today, when visiting the St. Joseph's Oratory, it is amazing to see the thousands of crutches and braces left behind by those who were cured. People continue to pray, through the intercession of St. Joseph and Br. Andre, for their many needs. In the words of Br. Andre: "Seldom have I met someone who has come to the shrine and left without consolation, without feeling better about life." "Place yourself in God's hands. He will not abandon you." Yearly, over two million people visit St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal, the largest shrine in the world to St. Joseph. Br. Andre is entombed there.
